2022 Resident Survey Report of Results

May 2022



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Executive Summary

Survey Background

Understanding the needs of residents is important to Olmsted County government, so it has conducted a regular, periodic survey of residents' opinions. This report includes Olmsted County survey results dating back to 2008. In 2022, Olmsted County was joined by Scott County, Washington County, St. Louis County and Dakota County, all working together with Polco/National Research Center (NRC) to develop a survey instrument with a set of shared questions, as well as questions unique to each county.

The Olmsted County Residential Survey was administered by mail to 4,400 randomly selected households in January 2022. Of the approximately 4,265 households that received a survey in the mail (135 were vacant or otherwise undeliverable by the post office), 842 completed and returned the survey; providing a response rate of 20% and a margin of error of $\pm 3.4\%$.

Comparisons of the 2022 results were compared to Olmsted County's past years and to other communities, providing additional context to the results. To make some of these comparisons possible, ratings were converted to a 100-point scale which creates a uniform metric (e.g., 100=excellent, 67=good, 33=fair and 0=poor). Olmsted County elected to invoke Polco/NRC's national benchmark database to have its results compared to those of other counties around the nation. This database contains resident perspectives gathered in resident surveys from over 500 jurisdictions, including cities and counties. Approximately 60 counties are included in the database.

Survey Highlights

Olmsted County residents continue to enjoy a high quality of life.

- ◆ Olmsted County's average rating for quality of life was higher than the national benchmark for other counties. At 73, it fell just above "good", which is 67 on the 100-point scale (where 100=excellent).
- ◆ When asked to identify the one thing that residents liked most about living in Olmsted County, "quality of life in general" was most frequently chosen (38%), followed by location (15%), rural/small town feel (11%) and their neighborhood (10%).
- ◆ Digging into specific community characteristics, Olmsted County received high marks as a place to raise a family, as a place to work and as a place to live (73, 72 and 71, respectively, on the 100-point scale, or just above "good"). These were similar to or higher than the national benchmarks.

As in past years, residents feel safe in Olmsted County.

- ◆ Respondents were asked about how safe they felt in specific places or relative to specific safety concerns (such as crime). They felt most safe in government buildings and in their neighborhoods and the least safe on county roads due to distracted or

drunk or impaired drivers. Although residents gave the lowest ratings for safety from distracted drivers, the rating improved from 2019 to 2022.

- ◆ Violent crimes and property crimes were compared to other counties in the US. Each of these received a lower rating than that benchmark.
- ◆ When county residents were asked how much of a problem crime was on a 100-point scale, it was rated just below the midpoint of the scale (about halfway between a “minor” and “moderate” problem).

Olmsted County Government performance indicators are stable with room for growth.

- ◆ About 4 in 10 residents rated the job the government is doing at fulfilling its vision of “a dynamic, world-class County delivering excellence every day” as excellent or good and 45% rated it as fair.
- ◆ When asked to rate nine categories of Olmsted County government performance, respondents rated “the value of county services to the quality of life in their neighborhood” most positively with an average rating of 52 on the 100-point scale (halfway between “fair” and “good”).
- ◆ Of the 6 comparable categories across the nation, three received a lower rating and three received a similar rating to the benchmarks.
 - Similar: the value of services for the taxes paid, generally acting in the best interests of the community, and overall quality of services provided by Olmsted County.
 - Lower: the job Olmsted County government does of providing information to residents, the job Olmsted County government does at managing tax dollars and the job the county does at listening to residents.
- ◆ Residents who had contact with a county employee or official in the 12 months prior to the survey gave high scores to their interactions. All characteristics (e.g., the employee’s knowledge and courteousness) received average ratings of between “excellent” and “good” on the 100-point scale, and ratings remained stable from 2019 to 2022.

Affordable housing and childcare remain high concerns for residents.

- ◆ Lack of housing and high taxes were viewed as the most problematic among ten potential problems that residents were asked to consider and rate. On average, lack of housing and high taxes were thought to be moderate problems, whereas items like traffic safety and traffic congestion were closer to “minor problems”.
- ◆ The availability of affordable child care and affordable housing were rated lowest among 15 characteristics of Olmsted County, receiving ratings of 27 and 26 on the 100-point scale (or between “fair” and “poor”). All other items received scores between 48 to 73 on the 100-point scale. Additionally, when compared to county benchmarks, Olmsted’s ratings were lower.
- ◆ Given this continued concern, an additional set of questions related to affordable housing in Olmsted County was added in 2019. In both years, about 7 out of 8 residents said it was essential or very important to have adequate housing choices for people of all incomes, ages, and abilities. When asked what type of affordable

housing was lacking, 6 in 10 cited entry-level/low-income housing and affordable middle-income housing.

Residents use many sources to connect with the county and have high ratings for the staff.

- ◆ About 4 in 10 residents had direct contact with a government office or official in the 12 months prior to the survey; this has ranged from 40-50% since 2008. The employees involved in those interactions were rated well for their knowledge and courtesy, and their overall rating was higher than the benchmark.
- ◆ Olmsted survey respondents said they most often turned to other county residents (78%), to television news broadcasts/cable TV (72%) or to the Olmsted County website (69%) as “minor” or “major” sources of information about the county.
- ◆ Just over half of respondents had visited the Olmsted County website in the prior two years.

Ratings related to diversity and inclusion suggest the concern is lower, but there is room for improvement.

- ◆ When asked about challenges related to diversity in Olmsted County, on average residents rated “discrimination/attitudes towards diverse people” and “lack of opportunities for people of color” a 45 on a 100-point scale, or a bit closer to a minor problem (33) than a moderate problem (67).
- ◆ Olmsted County residents rated their community at close to 50 on the 100-point scale, or midway between “good” and “fair” as a place where all residents treat each other with respect and the openness and acceptance of people of diverse backgrounds.

Survey Background

Survey Purpose

The Olmsted County Resident Survey provides residents the opportunity to rate the quality of life in the county, as well as service delivery and their satisfaction with county government. The survey also permits residents to provide feedback to the government about what is working well and what is not, and to share their priorities for community planning and resource allocation.

In 2022, Olmsted County collaborated with Dakota, Scott, St. Louis and Washington Counties on this survey project. The five counties worked together with Polco/National Research Center, Inc. to develop a survey instrument with a set of shared questions, as well as questions unique to each county. This report presents Olmsted County's results.

Survey Methods

A total of 4,400 Olmsted County households were selected at random to receive an invitation to participate in the 2022 survey. Each selected household was contacted three times over the course of about three weeks starting January 2022. First, a postcard was mailed notifying residents that they had been chosen to participate in the survey and inviting recipients to complete the survey online. For 2,860 households, a survey packet followed in the mail one week after the postcard, and a second survey packet was sent one week after the first packet. For the remaining 1,540 households, one additional postcard with an invitation to complete the survey online was mailed one week after the first. (A more detailed explanation of the methodology used in 2022 can be found in the section "Note on Change in Survey Methodology from 2019 to 2022" in *Appendix H: Survey Methodology*). There were 842 respondents, yielding a response rate of 20% and a margin of error of $\pm 3.4\%$.

Survey results were weighted so that age, gender, race/ethnicity, length of residency, housing tenure (rent versus own), housing unit type (detached versus attached), and commissioner district were represented in the proportions reflective of the entire community. A copy of the questionnaire and mailing materials are included in *Appendix I: Survey Materials*.

Reporting the Results

Putting Responses on a 100-Point Scale

Although responses to many of the evaluative questions were made on a four-point scale with four representing the best rating and one the worst, many of the results in this summary are reported on a common scale where zero is the worst possible rating and 100 is the best possible rating. If everyone reported "excellent," then the result would be 100 on the 100-point scale. Likewise, if all respondents gave a "poor" rating, the result would be zero on the 100-point scale. If the average rating for quality of life was "good," then the result would be 67 on a 100-point scale; "fair" would be 33 on the 100 point scale. Use of this converted scale to show average ratings allows for comparisons to other jurisdictions,

where different question wording and response scales may have been used. (More explanation is provided on page 193 in *Appendix H: Survey Methodology*.)

Rounding

When a figure for a question that required a single response does not total exactly 100%, it is due to the common practice of percentages being rounded to the nearest whole number.

Don't Know Responses

On many of the questions in the survey, respondents gave an answer of “don’t know.” The proportion of respondents giving this reply is shown in the full set of responses included in *Appendix A: Responses to Survey Questions* and is noted in the tables and figures in the body of this report if it is 20% or greater. However, these responses have been removed from the analyses presented in the body of the report, unless otherwise indicated. In other words, the majority of the figures in the body of the report display the responses from respondents who had an opinion about a specific item.

Comparing Survey Results Over Time

Olmsted County survey data was collected by phone in 2008. In 2013, the county switched data collection from phone to mail and continued with mail in 2022. As a consequence of the switch in methodology, a decline in virtually all ratings in 2013 was both expected and observed. In the previous survey administration by phone in 2008, a small sample of residents was surveyed by mail in order to explore the magnitude of the differences between phone and mail survey responses in Olmsted County. Using 2008 survey research conducted by Polco/NRC in Olmsted County that compared mail and phone responses, as well as Polco/NRC’s analysis of national trends comparing phone and mail responses, Polco/NRC adjusted the findings from 2008 in order to maximize the comparability of results over time. This way the reported trendline data are not influenced by the decline that is attributable to the change in data collection mode from phone to mail. Additional information on the comparing previous survey results can be found in *Appendix H: Survey Methodology*.

Because this survey was the fifth in a series of resident surveys, the 2022 results are presented along with past ratings when available. Trend data for Olmsted County represent important comparisons and should be examined for improvements or declines. Deviations from stable trends over time especially represent opportunities for understanding how local policies, programs or public information may have affected residents’ opinions.

Comparing Survey Results by Geographic and Demographic Subgroups

Select survey results were compared by demographic characteristics of survey respondents and geographic area of residence. Comparisons by geographic area are displayed in graphical form and discussed throughout the body of the report (the full set of results by location and demographic characteristics can be found in *Appendix C: Survey Results by Respondent Characteristics*).

Each table in the appendices that provide comparisons includes the results of ANOVA tests to determine whether results between specific subgroups are statically different. An explanation of how the statistical differences are denoted can be found on page 65.

Comparing to Results to Other Jurisdictions

Jurisdictions use benchmark comparisons to help interpret their own resident survey results, to create or revise community plans, to evaluate the success of policy or budget decisions, and to measure local government performance. It is difficult to judge what is small or large without comparing to benchmarks.

Polco/NRC's database of comparative resident opinion is comprised of resident perspectives gathered in resident surveys from over 500 jurisdictions whose residents evaluated local government services. Conducted with typically no fewer than 400 residents in each jurisdiction, opinions are intended to represent over 30 million Americans. Jurisdictions in Polco/NRC's normative database are distributed across the country and range from small to large in population size.

National county benchmark comparisons have been included in the report when available, and all available benchmarks are shown in *Appendix F: Benchmark Comparisons*. A list of the jurisdictions to which Olmsted County was compared is also found in that appendix. Benchmark comparisons have been provided when similar questions on the Olmsted County survey are included in Polco/NRC's database and there are at least five jurisdictions in which the question was asked, though most questions are compared to more than five other jurisdictions across the country.

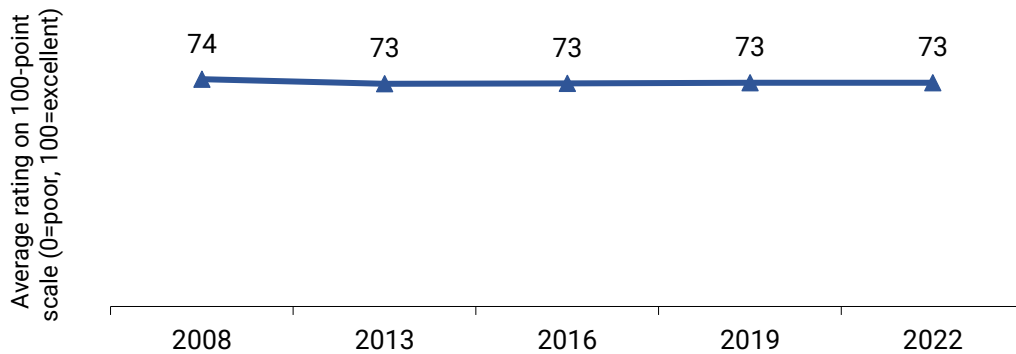
Where comparisons for quality ratings were available, the county's results were generally noted as being "higher" than the benchmark, "lower" than the benchmark or "similar" to the benchmark. In instances where ratings are considerably higher or lower than the benchmark, these ratings have been further demarcated by the attribute of "much," (for example, "much lower" or "much higher").

Quality of Life and Community

Survey respondents were asked to rate their overall quality of life in Olmsted County. On a 100-point scale where zero equals “poor” and 100 equals “excellent,” Olmsted County’s average rating was 73, which was similar to previous years. Olmsted County’s overall quality of life was higher than ratings given by other counties in the benchmark database (see *Appendix F: Benchmark Comparisons* for more detail).

Those completing the survey were asked to identify one thing that they liked most about living in Olmsted County. Quality of life in general was most frequently cited by respondents, with 38% selecting it as the thing they liked most. Other more common responses were the location (15%), the rural/small town feel (11%) and residents' neighborhoods (10%). All other categories were chosen by fewer than 1 in 10 respondents. When a respondent identified an unlisted or "other," reason, the response was captured verbatim. These responses appear in *Appendix B: Verbatim Responses to Survey Questions*.

The proportions of residents that selected each option remained stable from 2019 to 2022. Those in District 4 and 7 were the most likely to cite the rural/small town feel as what they like most. Residents who were older, lived in the county longer or owned their homes were more likely than those who were younger, newer to the county or rented to cite quality of life in general. Compared to their counterparts, younger residents were more likely to cite parks/lakes and those with household incomes below \$50,000 were more likely to choose the location or open space as their favorite thing.

Please note that the question was presented as a fixed response (i.e., respondents were shown a list of items from which to choose) from 2013 onward, whereas, in 2008, this question was open-ended (i.e., no list was presented). When provided a list to choose from, a respondent may by-pass their first thought (say, "location") as the list reminds them of other things they value (like their neighborhood), while in an interview a respondent would more likely stay with their first thought. Thus, it is recommended that the reader make little of the differences between the 2008 responses and responses from other survey years.

Across the survey years, response options have changed, been added and removed. In 2008, the items "rural" and "small town feel" were individual categories and in 2013 only "my neighborhood" was "my community." "Employment" was "job opportunities" in 2008.

County Characteristics

When asked to rate various community characteristics as they related to the county as a whole, most characteristics received average ratings that were between “good” and “fair” with a few hovering above “good” on a 100-point scale, where zero represents “poor,” 33 represents “fair,” 67 represents “good,” and 100 is equivalent to “excellent” (see Figure 3 on the following page). Olmsted County as a place to raise a family, as a place to work and as a place to live received the highest average ratings (73, 72 and 71, respectively, on the 100-point scale, or just above “good”). Availability of affordable child care and affordable housing were rated less positively (27 and 26 on the 100-point scale, respectively, or between “fair” and “poor”).

Compared to 2019, most characteristics remained stable in 2022. However, ratings for openness and acceptance of people of diverse backgrounds and availability of public transportation options decreased from 2019 to 2022.

In general, Olmsted County ratings were similar to or higher than ratings given in other counties across the country, although ratings for Olmsted County as a place to retire and the availability of affordable child care and housing received ratings that were lower when compared to the benchmark.

When differences emerged by demographic characteristics, respondents in Districts 5, 6 and 7 gave more positive ratings than other districts in most categories. Residents who were younger (18-34), lower income, newer to the community, or who rented their home were more likely to give lower ratings on most characteristics of Olmsted County compared to others. (see *Appendix C: Survey Results by Respondent Characteristics* for more information).

Note that approximately 32% of respondents reported “don’t know” when asked about the availability of affordable quality child care (see Appendix A: Responses to Survey Questions). Results presented in the report body are for those who had an opinion. In 2013, 'Availability of affordable housing' was 'Availability of affordable quality housing,' 'Availability of affordable child care' was 'Availability of affordable quality child care,' and 'Availability of affordable health care' was 'Availability of affordable quality health care.' 'Availability of public transportation options' was a new question in 2016.

Issues Facing the Community

To help assess pressing issues the community may face, questions about safety and possible problems in the county were included on the survey, along with questions about health concerns in the county.

Community Safety

Residents were asked how safe they felt from different types of crimes and drunk driving, as well as safety in different county locations (see Figure 4 on the next page). On the 100-point scale where zero is “very unsafe,” 33 is “somewhat unsafe,” 67 represents “somewhat safe,” and 100 is equivalent to “very safe,” average ratings ranged from 46 to 87 points; or between “somewhat unsafe” and “very safe.”

Respondents felt the safest in government buildings and in their neighborhood and felt the least safe on county roads due to distracted or drunk or impaired drivers.

Safety ratings were compared to ratings in 2019. Residents reported improved feelings of safety in 2022 in Olmsted County parks and trails and from distracted drivers, and slightly less safe in government buildings. All other ratings were similar to 2019.

Violent crimes and property crimes were compared to other counties in the US; each of these received a lower rating than the national benchmark for counties.

Residents residing in Districts 5 and 6 tended to report higher feelings of safety in all categories when compared to residents residing in other districts (see *Appendix C: Survey Results by Respondent Characteristics* for more details). When the ratings were compared by the demographic characteristics of survey respondents, Olmsted County residents who were younger than age 35, had lived in Olmsted County for five years or less or earned an income of \$50,000 or more were more likely to give positive ratings to feelings of safety than their counterparts.

In 2016, safety for 'While in Olmsted County Government buildings' was a new item. Several items also had wording changes: 'From identity theft (e.g., fraud, scams, credit card theft)' was 'From identity theft' and 'From distracted drivers on County roads (e.g., texting/talking on the phone, reading, changing music stations, eating/drinking)' was 'From distracted drivers on County roads.' In 2008, 'From drunk or impaired drivers on County roads' was 'Drunk driving when traveling within the County.'

Potential Problems

County residents responding to the survey evaluated a list of potential problems as being a “major problem,” a “moderate problem,” a “minor problem,” or “not a problem” in Olmsted County. When converted to the 100-point scale where zero equals “not a problem” and 100 equals “major problem”, each item on the list of potential problems was thought to be between a “minor” or “moderate” problem (between 33 and 67 points).

Lack of housing options and high taxes were viewed as the most problematic (a moderate problem on average). Traffic safety and traffic congestion were the least problematic - viewed as between a “moderate problem” and a “minor problem” with an average rating of 44 and 37, respectively.

In 2022, lack of housing options, homelessness and lack of livable wage jobs were rated as more of a problem when compared to evaluations given in 2019, while traffic congestion was considered less of a problem in 2022 compared to 2019.

Ratings of the various potential problems were compared by select respondent demographics. Where differences emerged, residents from District 3 were more concerned with all items excluding high taxes, which was of higher concern for District 7 residents.

Residents aged 55 and older, those who earned less than \$50,000 per year or had lived in Olmsted County for more than 20 years and women, were generally more concerned with most of the listed problems than their counterparts.

Prior to 2019, 'lack of livable wage jobs' was 'availability of livable wage jobs' and 'high taxes' was 'taxes.'

Health Concerns

Respondents also were asked to rate potential health concerns in Olmsted County. The average ratings for almost all potential health concerns, where zero equals “not at all a concern” and 100 equals a “major concern,” fell between a “moderate” and “minor” concern.

Depression, anxiety, or other mental health challenges (66), illicit drug use (61), social isolation (61) and support of persons with mental health challenges (61) were identified as the biggest concerns to residents. Respondents were less concerned with tobacco use (44) and environmental hazards (36) as health concerns.

A higher number of health concern ratings showed a decrease in concern between 2019 and 2022 than showed an increase. The only area that increased in concern was the spread of infectious diseases, as would be expected given the COVID-19 pandemic. Areas that decreased in concern from 2019 to 2022 were illicit drug use, overweight adults and children, misuse of prescribed medications, domestic violence, excessive alcohol use among adults, underage alcohol use, tobacco use and environmental hazards. The rest were similar to 2019.

When these ratings were compared by county commissioner district, respondents living in District 3 were more likely to indicate that suicide/attempted suicide, excessive alcohol use among adults, misuse of prescribed medications, the support of persons with disabilities, adequacy of school readiness for children and spreading of infectious disease were high concerns compared to other districts. District 4 was more likely than most other districts to be concerned about tobacco use (including E-cigarettes and chewing tobacco) and underage alcohol use.

When compared by demographic characteristics, residents who were age 55 or older, were women, had lower income (less than \$50,000 household income) or had lived in the community for at least six years were more likely than others to feel concerned about most of the listed health concerns.

Note: in 2019, more than 20% of respondents answered “don’t know” when evaluating the following health concerns: bullying, suicide/attempted suicide, adequacy of school readiness for children, abuse and neglect of older adults and domestic violence.

In 2013, 'Depression, anxiety, or other mental health challenges' was 'Depression or other mental illnesses' and in 2008 it was 'Depression;' 'Overweight adults' and 'Overweight children' were 'Obesity in adults' and 'Obesity in children' and these were combined as 'Overweight adults and children;' 'The support of older adults,' 'The support of persons with disabilities,' and 'The support of persons with mental health challenges' was 'The health and support of older adults' and 'The health and support of persons with disabilities' was combined as 'The health and support for our elderly and disabled;' 'Tobacco use (including E-cigarettes and chewing tobacco)' was 'Tobacco use;' and 'Suicide/attempted suicide' was 'Suicide' in 2013. Prior 2022 'Excessive alcohol use among adults' was 'Alcohol abuse among adults;' 'Misuse of prescribed medications' was 'Illegal use of prescribed medications'.

Environmental Concerns

Residents were asked how much of a concern eight environmental issues were in Olmsted County: where zero equals “not at all a concern” and 100 equals “major concern.” All of these measures were rated below the midpoint of the 100-point scale, between “minor concern” and “moderate concern.”

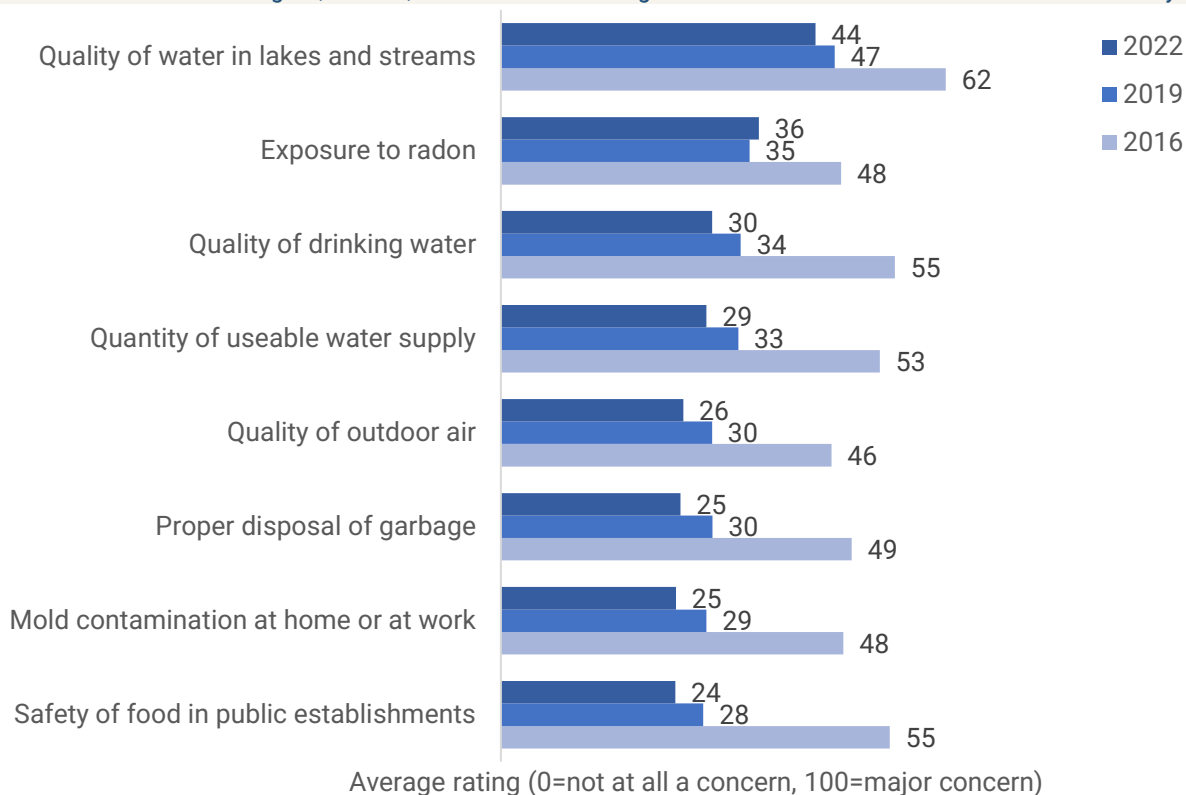
The quality of water in lakes and streams (44) was identified as the biggest environmental concern to respondents, while the safety of food in public establishments (24) was the lowest concern.

Overall, respondents in 2022 were slightly less concerned about most environmental issues compared to 2019.

In a comparison between the seven commissioner districts, residents from District 3 were more likely than those from most other districts to cite quality of outdoor air, safety of food in public administrations, mold contaminations or proper garbage disposal as a concern. When comparing demographic features of the respondents, residents who were age 55 or older or who had lived in Olmsted County for 20 years or more or earned less than \$50,000 were more likely than other residents to feel the listed concerns were of greater concern.

Evaluation of Government Services

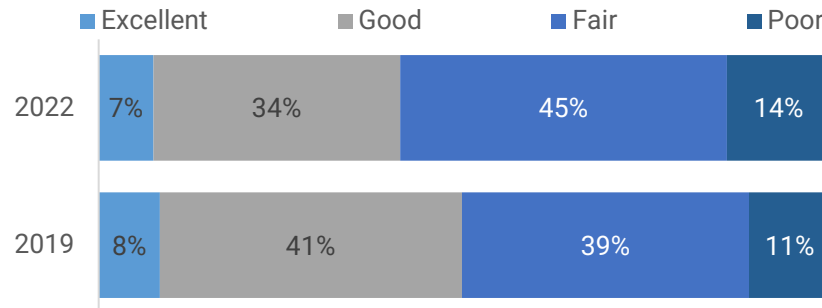
Residents completing the survey were asked a series of questions related to Olmsted County government's performance and the quality of county services.

Olmsted County's Vision

About 4 in 10 residents rated the job Olmsted County Government did at fulfilling its vision of "a dynamic, world-class County delivering excellence every day." as excellent or good and slightly 45% gave a rating of fair and 14% thought the county had done a poor job of fulfilling this vision. These were slightly lower ratings than in 2019.

County Government Performance

Survey respondents also rated nine specific categories of Olmsted County government performance. Most of the ratings were about halfway between “good” and “fair,” with a few landing closer to “fair.” The most positive ratings were for the value of Olmsted County services to the quality of life in their neighborhood, the job Olmsted County government does of providing information to residents, generally acting in the best interests of the community, and effectively planning for the future of the county.

Ratings were similar for most aspects of county government performance when comparisons could be made to ratings given in 2019. Residents of Districts 1, 4 and 7 gave lower ratings than those in other Districts for many of these items related to government performance.

Five of the nine categories were compared to counties across the nation. Olmsted County residents rated the job Olmsted County government does of providing information to residents, the job Olmsted County government does at managing tax dollars and the job the County does at listening to residents lower than the county benchmark. The value of services for the taxes paid to Olmsted County and generally acting in the best interests of the community were each rated similar to other counties.

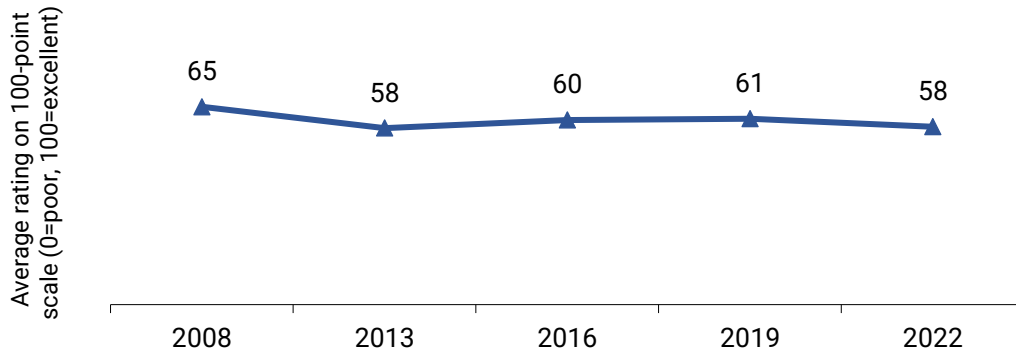
In 2013, 'Effectively planning for the future of the County' was 'Effectively planning for the future. 'The job Olmsted government does of providing information to residents' was 'The job Olmsted County government does at informing residents' and in 2008 this question was asked as an individual question "How would you rate the job the County does of informing its citizens?" with the same scale. In 2008, when asked, these questions used a different scale: "strongly agree," "somewhat agree," "somewhat disagree," "strongly disagree."

Overall Quality of County Services

Residents rated a variety of specific county services and the overall quality of services provided by Olmsted County. On average, those completing the survey rated the overall quality of county services as just below an average rating of “good,” 58 on the 100-point scale. This rating was similar to previous years and similar to the county benchmark comparison.

County Services

In addition to rating the overall quality of services provided by the county, respondents rated the quality of 27 county services. When converted to a 100-point scale where zero is equal to “poor” and 100 represents “excellent,” average scores for most County services rated in 2022 were between “fair” and “good” on the 100-point scale.

Yard waste drop-off and compost pick-up (71), household hazardous waste drop-off services (70) and elections (70) were rated highest, just above “good.” This was closely followed by passports (69), recycling and drop-off services at the Recycling Center Plus (69), property records (68), county parks and recreation (68) Sheriff’s Office services, (68) and vital records (67). Mental and chemical health services were among the lowest rated services (45).

Compared to 2019, ratings for most services were stable and didn’t change, but there were slight reductions in ratings for land use, planning and zoning, including permitting; protecting vulnerable adults; and the accessibility and functionality of the county website.

Ten of the 24 Olmsted County services could be compared to the benchmarks. Half of the services with benchmark comparisons were higher or much higher than the county benchmark comparison (maintenance and repair of county roads; recycling and drop-off services at the Recycling Center Plus; snow and ice removal on county roads; land use; and disaster preparedness and response). Five services received ratings similar to the benchmark (County parks and recreation; Sheriff’s Office services; protecting children; services to older adults; and public health services).

In general, where differences were observed, residents from Districts 5 and 6 gave higher performance ratings than those in Districts 3 and 4. Older residents gave higher ratings than younger residents for nine of the items, were similar for 17 items and gave lower ratings only for one item (assessment process/property tax system). Also, residents who had lived in Olmsted County for five years or less were more likely to think positively about county services compared to those who had lived in the county for a longer period of time, as were those in higher income brackets compared to lower.

Importance of Parks Services

A question was included on the survey to gauge the importance of providing activities in the parks system. Responses were converted to a 100-point scale where zero equals “not at all important,” 33 equals “somewhat important,” 67 equals “very important” and 100 equals “essential.”

The most important offering was natural areas for non-motorized activities such as hiking, canoeing, biking and horseback riding with an average rating of 76 on the 100-point scale (just above “very important”). The next priorities were safe public access to lakes and streams (75) and trail and greenway systems that connect parks and recreation sites (71). The offering rated lowest in importance was to increase number of camper cabins in parks (38). Respondents were also given the option to write in an “other” program or service that was of importance. These responses can be found in *Appendix B: Verbatim Responses to Open-ended Questions*.

Importance ratings increased from 2019 to 2022 for all items but two; the importance of food trucks and increasing number of camper cabins in parks remained stable from 2019 to 2022. Younger residents and renters rated most items as higher in importance compared to those aged 35 or older and homeowners. Among the districts, those in District 4 had the lowest ratings for the importance for most items.

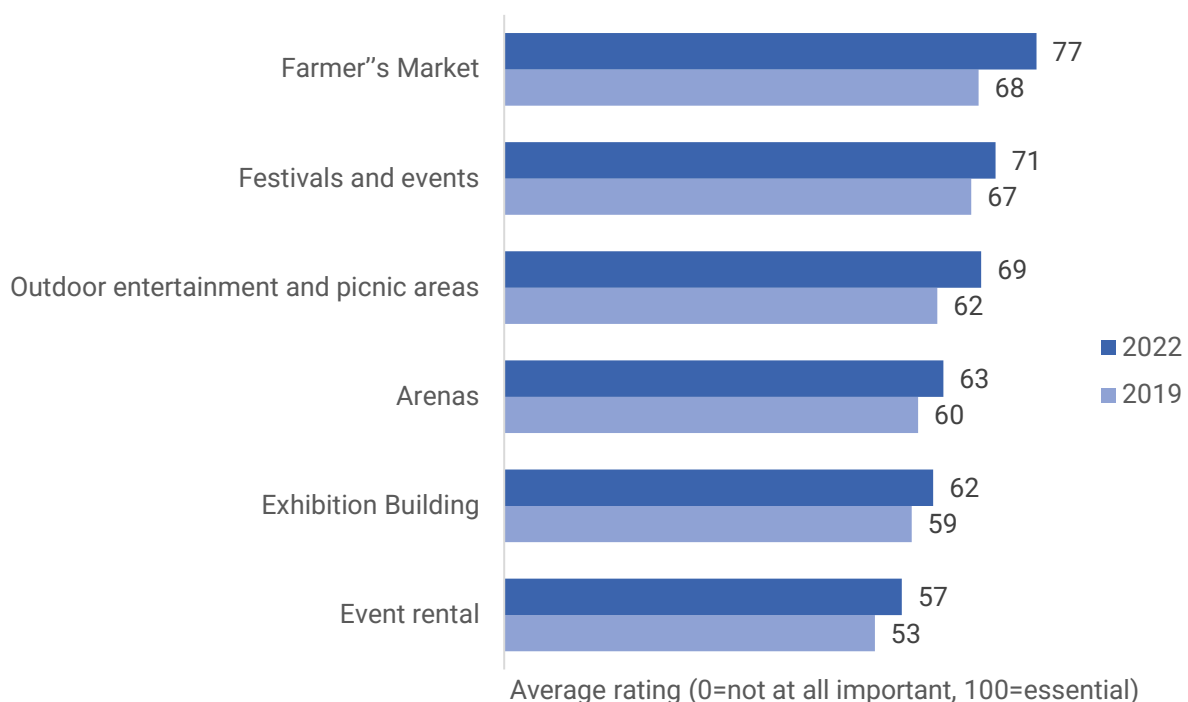
In 2019, 'safe public access to lakes and streams' was 'public boat access to Lake Zumbro'. Prior to 2019, 'equipment rentals such as canoes, paddleboats, snowshoes, skis' did not include 'skis,' 'Overnight accommodations for tents and RVs' included 'camper cabins' and 'community events' did not include 'Zippity Zoo Da' but did include 'Spring Fest.' For the 2022 survey, 'community events' removed 'Zippity Zoo da'; 'Increase ADA amenities such as paved paths, track chairs, ADA boat launch' was changed to 'Increase Americans with Disabilities Act amenities such as paved paths, track chairs, boat launch.'

Residents were asked how important they felt it was for several activities or services to be offered at Graham Park specifically. About 7 in 10 respondents thought it was essential or very important for the Farmer's Market; festivals and events; and outdoor entertainment and picnic areas to be offered at Graham Park and about 6 in 10 thought it was at least very important to offer arenas, the Expo Building or event rentals.

Most of the items had slight increases in their rating of importance from 2019 to 2022; none showed decreases. Those in District 4 gave the lowest importance ratings across the districts and for the items with a difference in ratings, younger adults and renters placed a bit more importance than older adults and homeowners.

Housing in Olmsted County

A question was added in 2019 to measure the importance of having adequate housing choices for people of all incomes, ages, and abilities. Results were similar in 2019 and 2022. About two-thirds of residents thought it was essential to have adequate housing choices and another 2 in 10 said it was very important; 12% felt it was somewhat important and only 2% of residents thought that it was not at all important.

Renters and those in multifamily dwellings were more likely than homeowners and those in single-family homes to place a high value on this, as were women compared to men, younger adults compared to older and newer residents compared to those more long tenured.

When asked what types of housing were of most concern, entry-level/low income and housing affordable for middle incomes topped the list.

Figure 14: Importance of Adequate Housing Choices for All in Olmsted County by Year

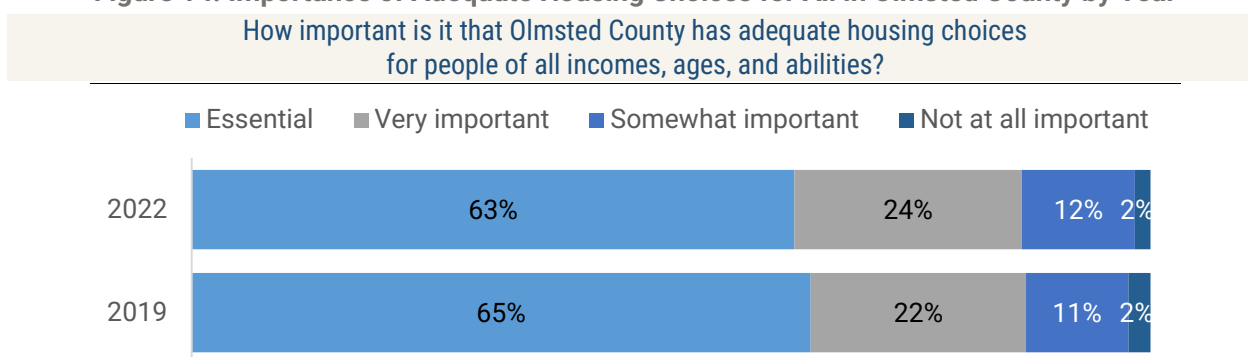
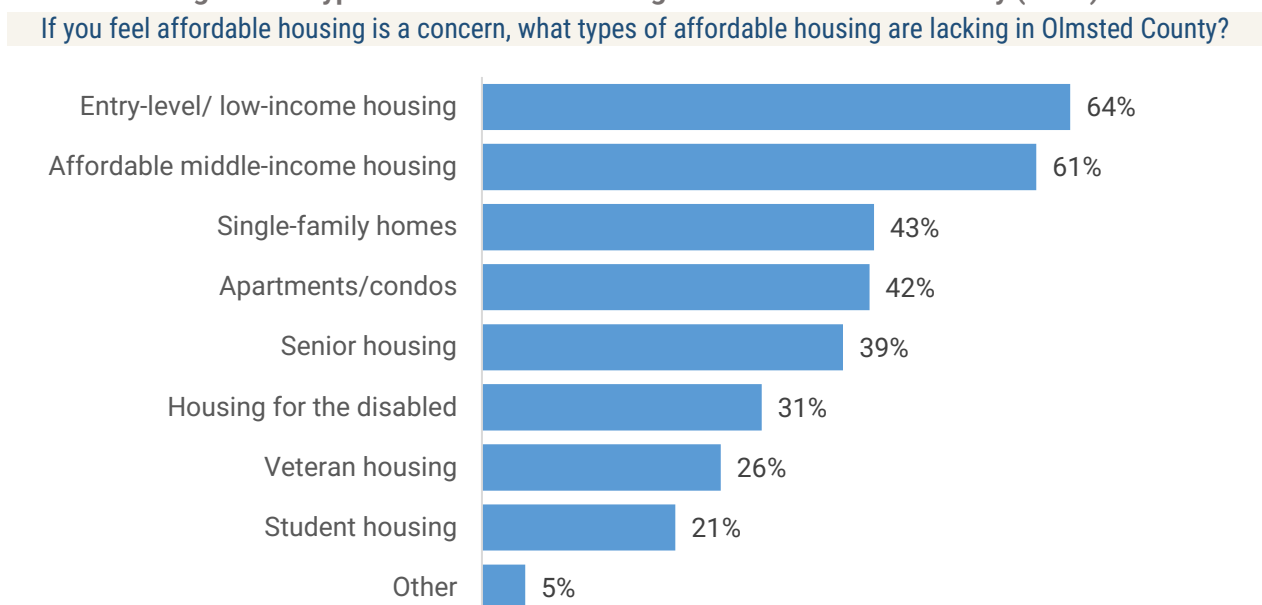


Figure 15: Types of Affordable Housing Needed in Olmsted County (2022)



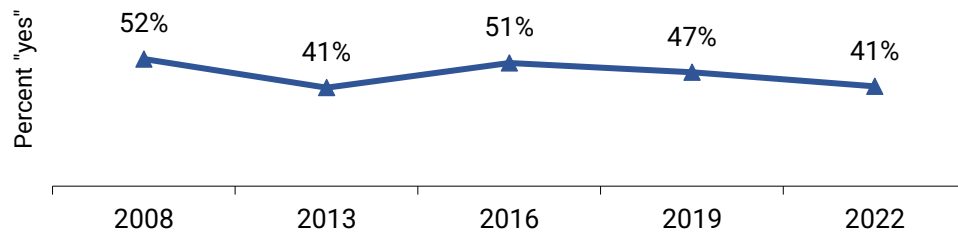
Contact with County Government

As in past years, respondents were asked if they had visited, telephoned, or emailed any Olmsted County government office within the previous 12 months. About 4 in 10 residents reported having had contact in 2022, which was slightly lower than the level of contact seen in 2019. The proportion of residents contacting county government was similar in Olmsted County to the average in counties across the nation.

This did not vary across the districts or demographic groups, except that older residents were more likely than younger to have contacted a government office or official.

The 41% of respondents who reported having contacted a county government office in the 12 months prior to the survey rated aspects of their most recent interaction. Ratings for all items were at or slightly above the average rating of “good” on the 100-point scale, and ratings remained stable from 2019 to 2022.

Those who were newer to the county (versus long term residents) and those with higher incomes (versus households earning \$50,000 or less) tended to give higher ratings to the interactions. Those in District 3 were more likely to give lower ratings, when differences between districts existed.

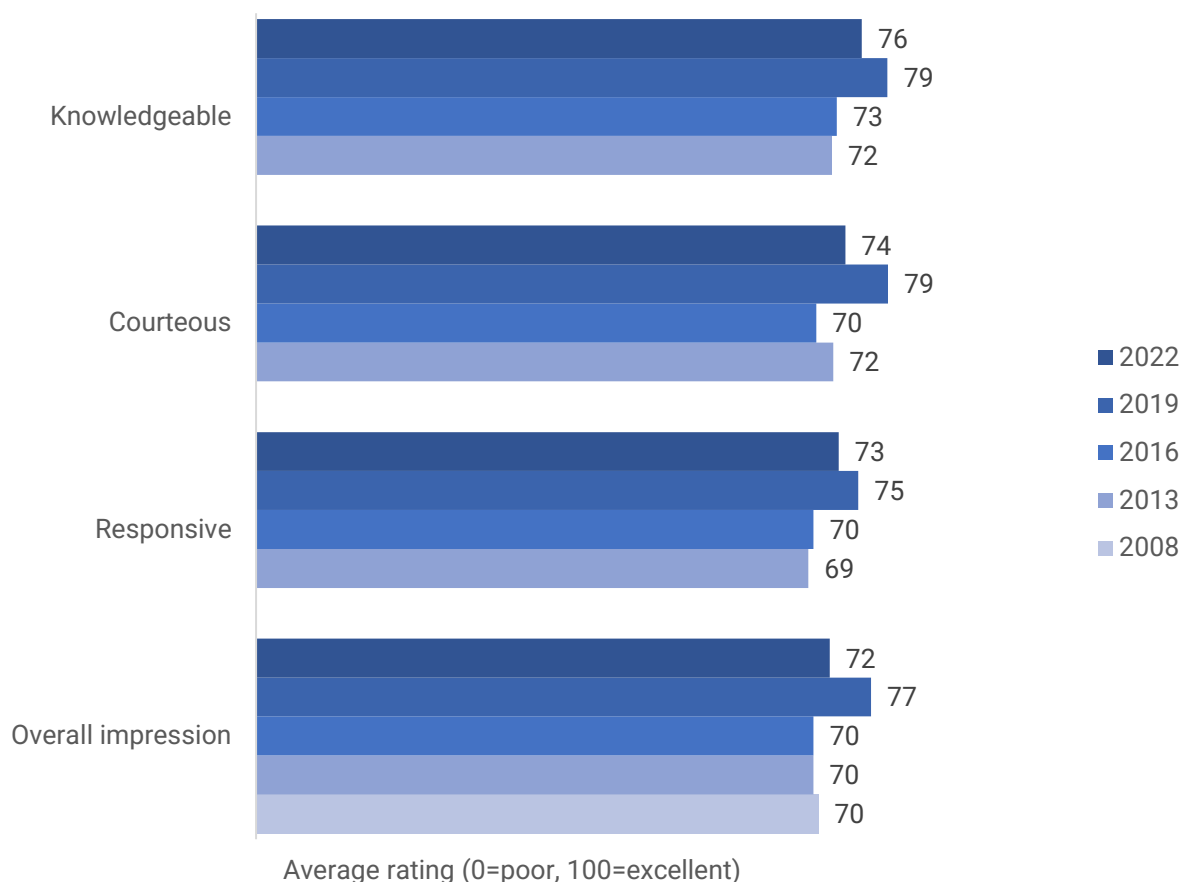
Residents who reported they had contact with an Olmsted County government office also evaluated the employees they encountered in their most recent contact. All ratings were rated between “excellent” and “good” on the 100-point scale, with the knowledge and courtesy of the employees rated highest among the qualities evaluated. These ratings decreased slightly from 2019, but still remain high.

When compared to ratings given by residents in other counties across the U.S., Olmsted County employees’ knowledge, courteousness, and responsiveness were rated similar to employees of other counties, while respondent ratings of their overall impression of the employee was higher than the benchmark.

Those who were newer to the county, those with higher incomes and those living in single-family homes tended to give higher ratings to the employees, compared to their counterparts. Again, those in District 3 were more likely to give lower ratings, when differences between districts existed.

Public Information and Communication

To understand the best ways to communicate with and inform residents about Olmsted County government and its services, the survey included a series of questions about public information sources and preferred methods of communication.

Potential Information Sources

Respondents were asked which potential sources of information about Olmsted County government they used most often. About three-quarters of respondents or more reported these channels as “minor” or “major” sources of information: other residents (neighbors or friends), the Olmsted County website, television news broadcasts/cable TV and other online resources. The least used sources of county information included phone calls to Olmsted County (38% “minor” or “major” source) and the Information Desk (29%).

Of the 12 information sources, all decreased in use from 2019 to 2022. The two that didn’t decrease (newspapers and public/community meetings) remained stable.

Younger residents were less likely users of all the communication channels, to get county information, than older residents as were men compared to women for most of the sources. Homeowners and those who lived in the county longer were more likely than their counterparts to name most of the channels as major or moderate sources.

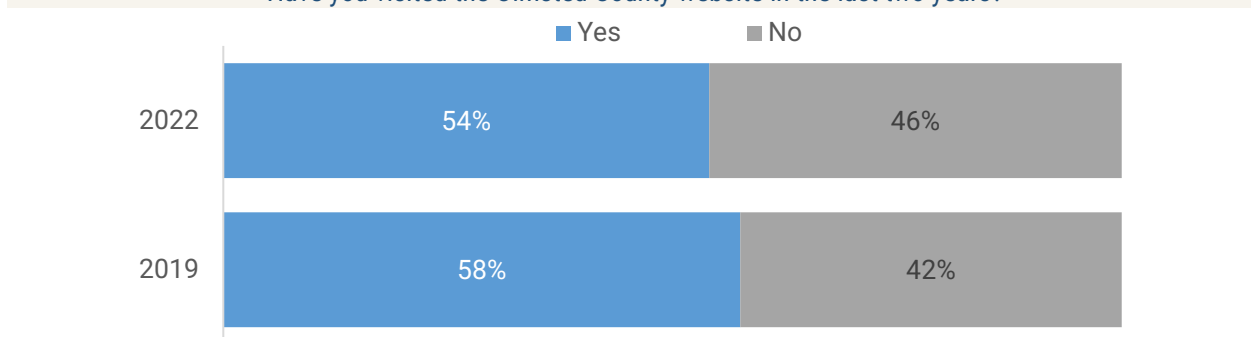
Olmsted County Website

Residents were asked whether they had visited the Olmsted County website in the last two years. In 2022, 54% of residents had visited the county website and 46% had not. This was statistically similar to 2019.

This did not vary by district, but those aged 35-54 (72%) were more likely to use the website than those aged 18-34 (58%) and those 55 and older were least likely (41%). Those with lower incomes were less likely to use the website as were those living in attached housing (apartments, etc.).

Figure 20: Used County Website in Last Two Years by Year

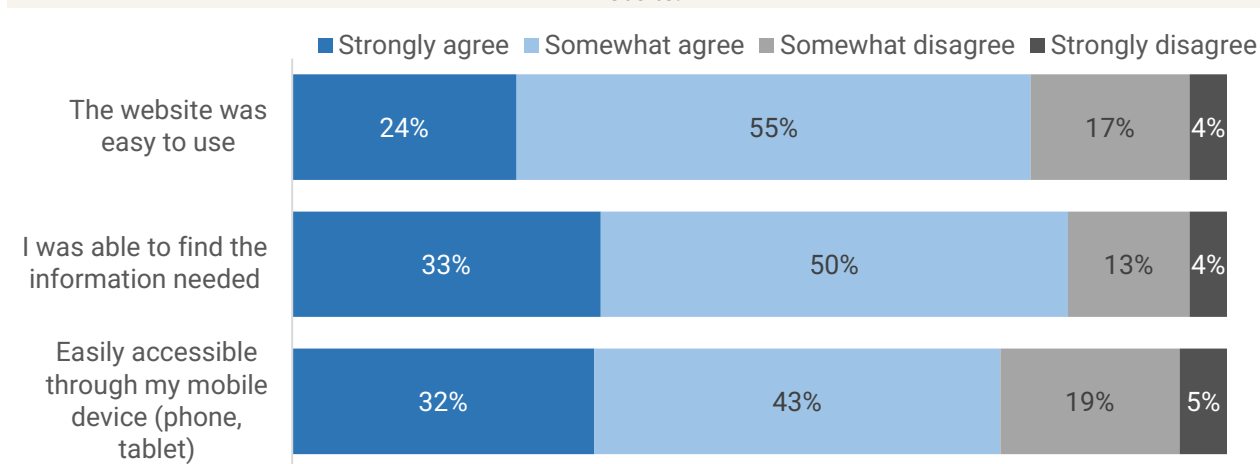
Have you visited the Olmsted County website in the last two years?



A new question on the 2022 survey asked those who had visited the county website in the last two years (roughly half of all respondents) to indicate their level of agreement with a series of statements about the website's ease of use. About 8 in 10 residents strongly or somewhat agreed that the county website was easy to use, that they were able to find the information needed, and that the website was easily accessible through their mobile device; about 2 in 10 disagreed with these statements.

Appendix C: Survey Results by Respondent Characteristics

Understanding the Tables

For most of the questions, for ease of comparison, responses have been condensed to show only average ratings on the 100-point scale across all response options (0=poor and 100=excellent or 0=very unsafe and 100=very safe).

Chi-square or ANOVA tests of significance were applied to these breakdowns of survey questions. A “p-value” of 0.05 or less indicates that there is less than a 5% probability that differences observed between groups are due to chance; or in other words, a greater than 95% probability that the differences observed in the selected categories of the sample represent “real” differences among those populations. As subgroups vary in size and each group (and each comparison to another group) has a unique margin of error, statistical testing is used to determine whether differences between subgroups are statistically significant.

For each pair or set of subgroup ratings within a row (a single question item) that has a statistically significant difference, an upper-case letter denoting significance is shown in the cell with the larger column proportion. The letter denotes the subgroup with the smaller column proportion from which it is statistically different. Subgroups that have no upper-case letter denotation in their column and that are also not referred to in any other column were not statistically different. Categories were not used in comparisons when a column proportion was equal to zero or one.

For example, in Table 45 on the following page, respondents in Districts 2 and 4 had the same average rating for overall quality of life in Olmsted County. Each of these cells contains a “C”, indicating that this rating is statistically significantly higher than the rating in Column C – which corresponds to District 3. Of course, the cells for Districts 2 and 4 do not contain a B, D or F, because they have the same rating, and these are not statistically significantly different. However, Column E and F do contain the letters A, B, C and D, indicating that the average rating of District 5 and 6 is also higher than that of District 1, District 2, District 3 and District 4. The ratings for District 1 and 3 are not statistically different than each other, as none contain a letter representing the other columns.

In some cases, survey results are displayed for subgroups within two characteristics, e.g., within sex and age of respondent. The lettering of the columns begins again on the next characteristic. So female is Column A, male is Column B, while age 18 to 34 years old is Column A again, followed by 35 to 54 years old in Column B and 55+ years old in Column C. Obviously, the letters in the in the cells only refer to differences within that characteristic, not to differences within the other characteristic.

Appendix E: Survey Results Compared to Other Participating Minnesota Counties

Understanding the Tables

Questions asked by more than one Minnesota County in 2022 are included in the following tables for comparison. Only results from the “scientific survey;” that is, from households that were randomly selected to participate in the survey, are included. For most of the questions, for ease of comparison, the average rating on the 100-point scale is used. If the cells for a particular County are blank in any given table, that means the question was not asked on that County’s survey. If the cells within a table contain a “.”, that means that particular item was not asked on that County’s survey.

Chi-square or ANOVA tests of significance were applied to these breakdowns of survey questions. A “p-value” of 0.05 or less indicates that there is less than a 5% probability that differences observed between groups are due to chance; or in other words, a greater than 95% probability that the differences observed in the selected categories of the sample represent “real” differences among those populations. As subgroups vary in size and each group (and each comparison to another group) has a unique margin of error, statistical testing is used to determine whether differences between subgroups are statistically significant.

For each pair or set of subgroup ratings within a row (a single question item) that has a statistically significant difference, an upper case letter denoting significance is shown in the cell with the larger column proportion. The letter denotes the subgroup with the smaller column proportion from which it is statistically different. Subgroups that have no upper case letter denotation in their column and that are also not referred to in any other column were not statistically different.

For example, on the next page, respondents in Dakota County (Column A) gave an average rating of 78 on the 100-point scale to their quality of life, and that cell contains B, C and D. This means that the Dakota County rating is statistically significantly higher than the ratings for Olmsted County (Column B), Scott County (Column C) and St. Louis County (Column D). The cell for the Washington County rating also contains a B, C and D, indicating that the Washington County rating was also higher than Olmsted, Scott and St. Louis. However, differences between Washington and Dakota County were not statistically significant, as the Dakota County cell does not contain an E, nor the Washington County cell an A. Additionally, the differences between ratings in Olmsted, Scott and St. Louis Counties were statistically significantly different, as Olmsted and Scott cells contain a D, indicating both values are significantly higher than the ratings for St. Louis County.

Appendix F: Benchmark Comparisons

Understanding the Benchmark Comparisons

Communities use the comparative information provided by benchmarks to help interpret their own resident survey results, to create or revise community plans, to evaluate the success of policy or budget decisions and to measure local government or organizational performance. Taking the pulse of the community has little meaning without knowing what pulse rate is too high and what is too low. When surveys of service satisfaction turn up “good” resident evaluations, it is necessary to know how others rate their services to understand if “good” is good enough or if most other communities are “excellent.”

Furthermore, in the absence of national or peer community comparisons, a community is left with comparing its library rating to its street maintenance rating. That comparison is unfair as street maintenance always gets lower ratings than libraries. More illuminating is how residents’ ratings of sheriff services compare to opinions about sheriff services in other communities and to resident ratings over time.

A sheriff department that provides the fastest and most efficient service – one that closes most of its cases, solves most of its crimes, and keeps the crime rate low – still has a problem to fix if the residents in the county rate sheriff services lower than ratings given by residents in other counties with objectively “worse” departments. Benchmark data can help that sheriff department – or any county department – to understand how well citizens think it is doing.

While benchmarks help set the basis for evaluation, resident opinion should be used in conjunction with other sources of data about budget, population demographics, personnel and politics to help administrators know how to respond to comparative results.

Comparison Data

Polco/NRC has designed a method for quantitatively integrating the results of surveys that we have conducted with those that others have conducted. These integration methods have been described thoroughly in *Public Administration Review*, *Journal of Policy Analysis and Management*, and in Polco/NRC’s first book on conducting and using citizen surveys, *Citizen Surveys: how to do them, how to use them, what they mean*, published by the International City/County Management Association (ICMA). Scholars who specialize in the analysis of citizen surveys regularly have relied on NRC’s work^{1, 2}. The method described in those publications is refined regularly and statistically tested on a growing number of citizen surveys in Polco/NRC’s proprietary databases.

Communities in Polco/NRC’s benchmark database are distributed geographically across the country and range from small to large in population size. Comparisons may be made to

all jurisdictions in the database or to subsets of jurisdictions (within a given region or population category or that meet select criteria outlined by the community).

Despite the differences in jurisdiction characteristics, all are in the business of providing local government services to residents. Though individual jurisdiction circumstances, resources, and practices vary, the objective in every community is to provide services that are so timely, tailored, and effective that residents conclude the services are of the highest quality. High ratings in any jurisdiction bring pride and a sense of accomplishment.

Polco/NRC's database of comparative resident opinion is comprised of resident perspectives gathered in citizen surveys from over 500 jurisdictions whose residents evaluated local government services and gave their opinion about the quality of community life. The comparison evaluations are from the most recent survey completed in each jurisdiction; most communities conduct surveys every year or in alternating years. Polco/NRC adds the latest results quickly upon survey completion, keeping the benchmark data fresh and relevant. Olmsted County's survey results were compared to counties across the nation.

Interpreting the Results

Average ratings were compared when questions similar to those asked in Olmsted County's survey were included in Polco/NRC's database, and there were at least five peer jurisdictions in which the question was asked. Where comparisons were available, three numbers are provided in the tables starting on the next page. The first column is Olmsted County's rating on the 100-point scale. The second column is the rank assigned to Olmsted County's rating among jurisdictions where a similar question was asked. The third column is the number of jurisdictions that asked a similar question. The fourth column shows the comparison of Olmsted County's average rating to the benchmark.

Where comparisons for quality ratings were available, Olmsted County's results were noted as being "higher" than, "lower" than or "similar" to the benchmark. In instances where ratings are considerably higher or lower than the benchmark, these ratings have been further demarcated by the attribute of "much," (for example, "much lower" or "much higher"). These labels come from a statistical comparison of Olmsted County's rating to the benchmark where a rating is considered "similar" if it is within five points of the average; "higher" or "lower" if the difference between Olmsted County's rating and the benchmark is greater than five points; and "much higher" or "much lower" if the difference between Olmsted County's rating and the benchmark is more than 10 points.

Comparisons for a number of items on the survey were not available in the benchmark database (e.g., some of the city services or aspects of government performance). These items are excluded from the benchmark tables.

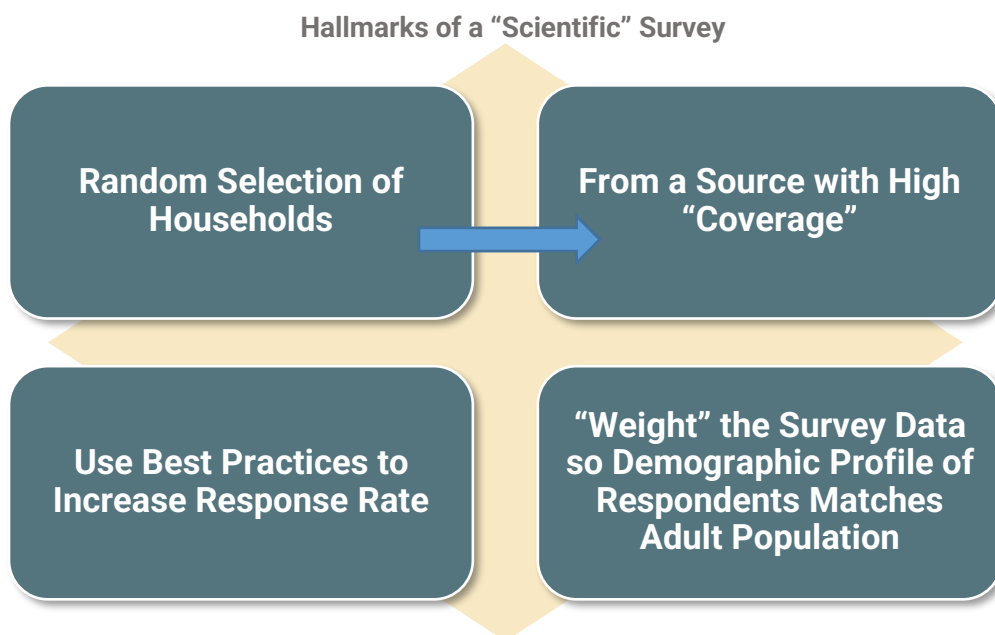

Appendix H: Survey Methodology

The Olmsted County Resident Survey provides residents the opportunity to rate the quality of life in the county, as well as service delivery and their satisfaction with county government. The survey also permits residents to provide feedback to the government about what is working well and what is not, and to share their priorities for community planning and resource allocation. The survey permits county staff and elected officials to hear from a broad range of the population. Olmsted County funded this research. Hallmarks of a “Scientific” Survey

The figure below displays the unique features of a scientific survey. The survey conducted by Polco/National Research Center, Inc. on behalf of Olmsted County was a scientific survey, and implemented using survey research best practices to provide a picture of the opinions of all adults living in the county.



Developing the Questionnaire

The resident survey questionnaire for Olmsted County was developed by starting with the version from the previous implementation in 2019. A list of topics was generated for new questions; items and questions were modified to find those that were the best fit for the 2022 project. In an iterative process between county staff and Polco/NRC staff, the final questionnaire was created. A copy can be found in *Appendix I: Survey Materials*.

Selecting Survey Recipients

The target population for the survey was adults who live in the limits of Olmsted County. The survey was designed as a mailed survey. The list from which survey recipients are selected is referred to as a “sampling frame.” A sampling frame was chosen which will

provide high “coverage,” meaning that almost every member of the target population has a chance of being selected.

Because local governments generally do not have inclusive lists of all the residences in the jurisdiction (tax assessor and utility billing databases often omit rental units), lists from the United States Postal Service (USPS), based on the Delivery Sequence File (DSF) used by the postal carriers to deliver the mail and updated every three months, usually provide the best representation of all households in a specific geographic location. A list of households within the zip codes serving Olmsted County was purchased from Go-Dog Direct. They provided a list of addresses that were selected using a systematic selection, a procedure where every Nth item is chosen, a process which closely approximates a random selection. A larger list than needed was sampled, as zip codes generally do not follow municipal boundaries and addresses that were not within county limits would be eliminated. Each of the addresses purchased was geocoded, and identified as being inside or outside county boundaries, and if inside the county, assigned to one of the seven Districts. A random selection was made of addresses within each district; 600 were selected from Districts 3, 4, 5, 6 and 7, while 700 addresses were selected from Districts 1 and 2, as lower responses rates had been observed from recipients in these districts in previous survey administrations. In addition, multi-family addresses (identified as those including a unit number) were oversampled at a rate of 5:3 compared to single family addresses. This oversampling is done as those who live in multi-family housing tend to respond to surveys at a lower rate than those in single family housing. In total, 4,400 households in Olmsted County were selected as survey recipients.

To ensure that survey results could be compared by district, a different color paper was used to print the survey for each district. A code for the color identifying the district was then data entered along with the responses to that survey. An individual within each household was randomly selected to complete the survey using the birthday method. (The birthday method selects a person within the household by asking the “person whose birthday has most recently passed” to complete the questionnaire. The underlying assumption in this method is that day of birth has no relationship to the way people respond to surveys.)

Administering the Survey

Each selected household was contacted three times over the course of about three weeks starting January 2022. First, a postcard was mailed to 4,400 households, selected at random, notifying residents that they had been chosen to participate in the survey and inviting recipients to complete the survey online. For 2,860 households, a survey packet followed in the mail one week after the postcard, and a second survey packet was sent one week after the first packet. For the remaining 1,540 households, one additional postcard invitation to complete the survey online was mailed one week after the first. About 3% of the surveys (135) were returned because they either had incorrect addresses or were received by vacant housing units. Of the estimated 4,265 remaining households, 842 completed the survey, providing a response rate of 20%. Typical response rates for a mailed resident survey range from 12% to 35%.

Note on Change in Survey Methodology from 2019 to 2022

In the past, NRC's standard approach to community survey "sampling" (e.g., creating the mailing list of randomly selected households) was to send paper copies of the survey to all selected households. Our traditional three-part mailing included a prenotification postcard to let the household know they had been selected for the survey, followed by two "waves" of the survey, one week apart. The five-page survey was accompanied by a cover letter with instructions and a postage-paid return envelope, and the cover letter contained a web link so that recipients could complete the survey online if they preferred.

Our current standard mailing approach for community surveys is what we refer to as a "hybrid" mailing in which some selected households receive the traditional three-part mailing as described above (Group A), while the remaining selected households receive two half-page-sized postcard invitations, one week apart, with a web link and instructions to go online to complete the survey (Group B). In Olmsted County, 65% of the 4,400 selected households received the Group A mailing, and the remaining 35% received the Group B mailing (more detailed information about the mailings is included in the preceding section). Perhaps as a result of this methodological shift, more survey responses were received in 2022 (842 in 2022 versus 708 in 2019). NRC's main focus is on the total *number* of responses versus the response *rate*, since the overall margin of error for the report is based solely on the number of responses and is unrelated to response rate.

There are two primary reasons for this shift in methodology. The first is that the hybrid mailing approach allows us to reach a significantly larger number of households for about the same cost; this is because printing and postage costs for postcards only are far lower than for printing and mailing the five-page survey (plus the cover letter and return envelope); there is also the additional cost of the postage for the respondent to mail the surveys back to NRC, as well as the cost of data-entering the responses from the paper surveys into an electronic dataset for analysis. (Whereas when a resident responds online to a survey, they are essentially data-entering their responses themselves, thus eliminating the need for any additional data entry). Further, technological shifts in recent years have led to most residents having internet access, which makes the option of responding online feasible for almost everyone.

The second reason for this methodological shift is that by encouraging more residents to take the survey online, they are directed to the county's profile on the Polco platform, and then asked if they would like to join the county's digital engagement panel. This panel of subscribers then gets notifications if the county posts new surveys or short polls on the platform, thus further increasing response and engagement. While the county's resident engagement panel will continue to grow over time as more outreach is done to spread community awareness about the county's Polco profile, the 2022 Resident Survey has been a good way to initially build that panel due to the fact that so many residents are directed to Polco in order to take the survey. As a result of this methodological shift, Olmsted County currently has about 202 subscribers on the Polco platform.

Finally, sending two different mailing types out within the same community, for the same survey, allows NRC to assess the difference in response rates for each approach and adjust our recommendations on the sampling approach in future years, if needed.

Survey results were weighted so that age, gender, race/ethnicity, length of residency, housing tenure (rent versus own), housing unit type (detached versus attached), and commissioner district were represented in the proportions reflective of the entire community. (For more information on the survey methodology, see *Appendix H: Survey Methodology*. A copy of the questionnaire and mailing materials are included in *Appendix I: Survey Materials*.)

Confidence Intervals

The 95% confidence interval (or “margin of error”) quantifies the “sampling error” or precision of the estimates made from the survey results. A 95% confidence interval can be calculated for any sample size, and indicates that in 95 of 100 surveys conducted like this one, for a particular item, a result would be found that is within a certain number of percentage points of the result that would be found if everyone in the population of interest was surveyed. The practical difficulties of conducting any resident survey may introduce other sources of error in addition to sampling error. Despite the best efforts to boost participation and ensure potential inclusion of all households, some selected households will decline participation in the survey (referred to as non-response error) and some eligible households may be unintentionally excluded from the listed sources for the sample (referred to as coverage error). The margin of error for this survey, with 842 respondents, is $\pm 3.4\%$.

Survey Processing (Data Entry)

Mailed surveys were returned to Polco/NRC directly via postage-paid business reply envelopes. Once received, staff assigned a unique identification number to each questionnaire. Additionally, each survey was reviewed and “cleaned” as necessary. For example, a question may have asked a respondent to pick two items out of a list of five, but the respondent checked three; Polco/NRC staff would choose randomly two of the three selected items to be coded in the dataset.

Once all surveys were assigned a unique identification number, they were entered into an electronic dataset. This dataset was subject to a data entry protocol of “key and verify,” in which survey data were entered twice into an electronic dataset and then compared. Discrepancies were evaluated against the original survey form and corrected. Range checks as well as other forms of quality control were also performed.

Polco’s web-based survey and analytics platform was used to collect the online survey data. Use of an online system means all collected data are entered into the dataset when the respondents submit the surveys. Skip patterns are programmed into the system, so respondents are automatically “skipped” to the appropriate question based on the individual responses being given. Online programming also allows for more rigid control of the data format, making extensive data cleaning unnecessary.

A series of quality control checks were also performed in order to ensure the integrity of the web data. Steps may include and not be limited to reviewing the data for clusters of repeat IP addresses and time stamps (indicating duplicate responses) and removing empty submissions (questionnaires submitted with no questions answered).

Analyzing the Results

Weighting the Data

The primary objective of weighting survey data is to make the survey sample reflective of the larger population of the community. This is done by comparing the demographic profile of survey respondents to that of the target population, adults living in Olmsted County. Weighting is a statistical adjustment where more weight is given to groups who responded at a lower rate than other groups, and less weight is given to those who responded at a higher rate. For example, in nearly all surveys, younger people respond at a lower rate than older people. Weighting rebalances the profile. The theory behind this weighting is that younger people (or other groups who tend to underrespond) who did participate in the survey are more like the younger people who did NOT participate than they are like the older people who did respond to the survey.³

Initial weights were calculated using an Iterative Proportional Fitting model via a python raking algorithm plug-in to SPSS. These initial weights were trimmed so that no case was given a weight greater than 5.5. No adjustments were made for design effects. The results of the weighting scheme are presented in the table on the next page. The variables that were used for weighting have been shaded grey.

³ An example of how weighting works may be helpful. Hypothetically, suppose the population norm for gender was 50%/50%, but 70% of the surveys we received were from females, and 30% were from males. The weights we would need to apply to make our sample representative of the population would be 0.7143 for females (thereby giving each response **less** weight in the overall ratings) and 1.6667 for males (giving each response **more** weight overall). Let's further suppose that these two groups had very different ratings of parks; females felt very favorably, with 80% of females giving a positive rating, and males felt much less favorable, with only 40% giving a positive rating. Given that we had more responses from women, if we did NOT weight the results, we would be left with a rosier picture of the perception of parks by residents than if we did weight the data. The unweighted average rating is 68% ($80\% \times 70\% + 40\% \times 30\%$), while the weighted average is 60% ($80\% \times 50\% + 40\% \times 50\%$).

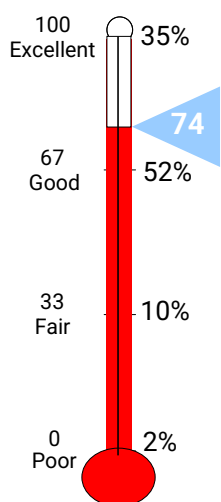

Putting Responses on a 100-Point Scale

Although responses to many of the evaluative questions were made on a four-point scale with four representing the best rating and one the worst, many of the results in this summary are reported on a common scale where zero is the worst possible rating and 100 is the best possible rating. If everyone reported “excellent,” then the result would be 100 on the 100-point scale. Likewise, if all respondents gave a “poor” rating, the result would be



zero on the 100-point scale. If the average rating for quality of life was “good,” then the result would be 67 on a 100-point scale; “fair” would be 33 on the 100-point scale. Use of this converted scale to show average ratings allows for comparison to other jurisdictions, where different question wording and response scales may have been used. This metric can sometimes be a little confusing. It is not the percent who rated the item as “excellent” or “good,” but an average rating spread out over 100 points. This scale can be thought of like the United Way fundraising thermometer – the greater the average rating, the closer to 100.

An example is shown in the table below of how survey responses to any particular item can be converted to the average rating on a 100-point scale. In this example, 32% of respondents gave an excellent rating, 46% a good rating and so on. The first step is to look only at the evaluative responses and eliminate the don’t know responses. The percents now total to 100% for just the excellent, good, fair and poor response options, as shown in the third column. The second step is to assign scale values to each response option. The third step is to create the average using these values – so taking the percent of respondents who gave each response, multiplying that by the value, and then summing them (in Step 4) to calculate the average rating. The thermometer image to the left represents how this rating can be considered like a United Way fundraising thermometer, where the average rating of 74 represents a thermometer that is about three-quarters full.

Statistical Analysis

The electronic dataset was analyzed using the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS). For the most part, frequency distributions and average (mean) ratings are presented in the body of the report. A complete set of frequencies for each survey question is presented in *Appendix A: Responses to Survey Questions*.

Also included are results by selected respondent characteristics (*Appendix C: Survey Results by Respondent Characteristics*). Chi-square or ANOVA tests of significance were applied to these breakdowns of selected survey questions. A “p-value” of 0.05 or less indicates that there is less than a 5% probability that differences observed between groups are due to chance; or in other words, a greater than 95% probability that the differences observed in the selected categories of the sample represent “real” differences among those populations. Where differences between subgroups are statistically significant, they are indicated in this appendix.

Comparing to Previous Survey Results

Olmsted County survey data were collected by phone in 2008. In 2013, the County switched data collection from phone to mail and continued with mail in 2022. Switching data collection from phone to mail was done to save costs, allow for more precise geographic sampling, cost-efficiently include cell phone-only households, gather more candid feedback and avoid interrupting residents with unwanted phone calls. The growing rate of county households with only a cell phone challenged the County to ensure their inclusion, which is easier, less expensive and more accurate by mail than phone.

Research is clear that a change in the method of survey data collection, by itself, will result in a change in results if the shift is from telephone administration to self-administration or vice versa. The change occurs even without change in resident perspectives and is attributed to the different environment that a survey respondent confronts when providing answers to a person on the telephone compared to offering private anonymous opinions. Questions by phone elicit more positive, optimistic, and socially-desirable responses than do the same questions asked on a written self-administered questionnaire. The self-administered questionnaire brings out more candid responses.

As a consequence of the switch in methodology, a decline from 2008 to 2013 in virtually all ratings was both expected and observed. In the previous survey administration by phone in 2008, a small sample of residents was surveyed by mail in order to explore the magnitude of the differences between phone and mail survey responses in Olmsted County. Using 2008 survey research conducted by Polco/NRC in Olmsted County that compared mail and phone responses, as well as Polco/NRC’s analysis of national trends comparing phone and mail responses, Polco/NRC adjusted the findings from 2008 in order to maximize the comparability of results over time. This way the reported trendline data are not influenced by the decline that is attributable to the change in data collection mode from phone to mail.

When results are reported as an average on the 100-point scale for a question that was asked similarly in previous years, a slight adjustment was made to permit direct comparison between phone and mail results. (Results that are reported as percentages and compared over time were not adjusted.) While the adjusted findings for data prior to 2013

reasonably control for the expected change from phone to mail data collection, the comparability of data over time does have some limitations. Not only is there sampling error in each survey administration, but also, the methods change occurred after a five-year gap in survey administrations and some question wording was inconsistent among survey years. Important historical differences are noted in the appropriate tables and figures. (Polco/NRC also was able to introduce statistical adjustments for the data prior to 2013 to account for any question and scale differences when possible. These adjustments are based on Polco/NRC's analysis of citizen surveys from across the nation.)
